

## Reception and Installation of the New Pipe Organ

Our new Patrick J. Murphy & Associates pipe organ arrived Sunday, August 2, in an 80-foot semi-trailer. Over 30 enthusiastic volunteers were on hand to welcome and unload it into the Ascension sanctuary. The total weight of organ pipes, chests, blowers, mechanism, and console transferred from truck to nave that afternoon exceeded 8 tons!!!

What had been estimated at taking 4 hours time to unload instead took 2-1/2 hours to accomplish with this magnitude of volunteers. Consequently, the five-man crew from Stowe, Pennsylvania was able to commence work erecting the organ the very next day. Three days later, nearly all of the mechanism, largest pipes (some over 16' tall), and cabinetry were in place. The capstone of this progress was hoisting and remounting the reredos sculpted by Arnold Ronnebeck (1931) into a more commanding position within the organ case. For the first time, this sculpture is now beautifully framed and properly lighted. During the remainder of first week, the Murphy crew installed expression louvers and a carved screen in the front of the south chamber, placed gold façade pipes with silver mouths in the cases surrounding the reredos, and connected electrical power, interior lighting, and winding from the two high-speed blowers.



By the beginning of the second week of installation, the organ was up and physically playing; testing being done on every electrical connection and the predetermined wind pressures for each of the instrument's divisions was set. During this week, all of the bass (Pedal) pipes were tuned and regulated and this same process was applied to treble pipes (Great and Swell manuals), as well. Pat Murphy visited the site and determined specific parameters for the final stage of installation - tonal finishing. The organ was allowed to settle into its new surroundings for three weeks and tonal finishing will commence September 8 and continue for 10-12 days. It is expected that the organ will be played at church services for the first time on September 13. The dedication is planned for Ascension Day, May 2010.

# Message from Father Tom

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## Dear friends in Christ,

We have a mini transition coming our way as we look forward to Fr. James and his family returning to full-time ministry after a wonderful, relaxing and renewing sabbatical. With Fr. James' return, I, as you're acting rector, will be returning to my previous role in ministry at Ascension which has been to help out on Sunday mornings, to be available to the larger community for various pastoral needs and to support Fr. James in his ministry. This is certainly a role that I have fully enjoyed in the past and am looking forward to once again.

The previous four months have been a wonderful opportunity for me to share Ministry with many of you. Even though it has been the summertime when activity is diminished, working with so many of you in a more intimate way has been a blessing. Possibly the greatest blessing of all over these past four months has been our worship in the chapel. It has been intimate and lively, all of us getting used to a different environment which was at the same time challenging and inviting. As you and I embrace and honor the different parts and pieces of a faithful spiritual journey, we will see the Spirit of God descend upon us like a dove, bringing new life to this small corner of the kingdom. I ask you to join me in celebrating this time of transition as we move from where we have been to where we will be, as we commit to keep our feet firmly planted in Christ who is the head and the cornerstone.

## Message from Deacon Bobbie

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I would like to take this opportunity to say a few words about **OUTREACH** and why it is so important. I know some of you dread that word, thinking that it means actually going out among the poor and oppressed, but there are many ways to serve. Ascension does a wonderful job of reaching out to the community. We are involved in many projects from St. Francis Center to mission trips to South Dakota, to helping people in Haiti. ## Ascension Family Profile



## ADULT CHOIR

The **Adult Choir** resumes rehearsal Thursday, September 3 at 7:00 PM in the Choir Room. It is not an auditioned ensemble and singers. Those who would like to develop their singing voices are always welcome to join us in rehearsal. High school students in Grades 9-12 are also encouraged to join us. All materials are provided in a manageable binder that allows singers to lead worship with assurance. Ascension Choir prepares a diverse repertoire including anthems in the Anglican tradition, a cappella motets, spirituals and contemporary anthems that serve to inspire Sunday worship and expand the musical horizons of volunteer singers. Rehearsals typically include prayer, physical, mental and vocal warm-ups, rehearsal of hymns, service music, and offertory anthems well in advance of their presentation. In addition, the Organist and Music Director is available for individual help on request. Post-rehearsal treats and choir parties are routinely provided for our singers. ## CHILDREN'S CHOIRS

**Youth Program Nights** resume on Wednesday, September 16. **Youth Choir Rehearsal** begins in the Choir Room at 5:30 PM. Choristers begin rehearsal with physical, mental and vocal warm-ups that prepare them to sing. Each youth chorister has their own binder in which to keep songs and other materials in order to review anthems, service music, and hymns that will be presented during any of seven designated 'Youth Sundays' during the school year (October 4, November 1, December 20 [Pageant], March 7, April 11 and May 2 and 16). As in the past, practice CD's are provided to each family. This is followed by **Dinner** at 6:10 PM in the Parish Hall which is provided on a rotating basis by parents and other interested persons. Nutritious but kid-friendly food such as tacos, sloppy Joes, pizza, etc. is generally served. The program night concludes with a **Junior Youth Group Activity** which ends by 7:00 PM. This might include a games, service work, Bible study, crafts and even activities organized by the Senior Youth Group. This activity is coordinated by Cary Mathis. Rehearsals prepare the children to present sacred songs following Communion on designated Youth Sundays with repertoire chosen to complement the Sunday School's *Godly Play* curriculum.

This ensemble welcomes new singers and instrumentalists who enjoy leading the congregation in praise and worship during the 10:00 AM service. How exactly do you lead others in praise and worship? ## In Memoriam

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**Blanche Taussig Cowperthwaite-Davis**, known for her advocacy of women's rights and commitment to serving Colorado, died on June 17, 2009 at the age of 100. She was married to **Arthur Cowperthwaite** at Ascension in 1929 and bore five children over a span of 25 years. Their oldest son, **Steve**, who died in 1998, was a lifelong parish member who served two terms on the Vestry, years apart, and was a perennial usher. Following the death of Arthur in 1990, Blanche married architect **Rodney Davis** in 1996 in the chapel at Ascension which he designed. He died in 1997. Among her many survivors is **Lucia Cowperthwaite**, widow of Steve and long-time chorister.

## The Greening of Ascension

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A few creative and concerned parishioners have proposed examining what the Church can do to reduce our carbon footprint, and help the environment in the neighborhood and the City.

The movement will start with small and simple measures like using electronic communications whenever possible to reduce paper use, recycling paper when it is used, i.e. Sunday bulletins and other handouts; using paper or china cups and plates instead of styrofoam for coffee hour, installing CFL (compact fluorescent light) bulbs wherever possible throughout the church buildings. We already recycle glass, aluminum and paper which is placed in bins behind the church, so we are talking about incremental additions, not major changes at first.
